About PaintCare Inc.

- Non-profit 501(c)(3) organization established in 2009
 - Works on behalf of public
- Created by the ACA as the paint industry's product stewardship organization
- Represents all paint manufacturers operating in PaintCare states (do not need to belong to ACA)
- Governed by a separate Board of architectural paint manufacturers
- Operational organization designs and implements all aspects of the paint stewardship program in states with the law

Why Paint?

- Studies show that approximately 10% of paint is leftover/unused
 - 65 millions gallons leftover annually in the US
- 50% of household hazardous waste is paint
- Cost and burden falls on municipal governments and government resources are limited, resulting in minimal opportunity to recycle or properly dispose of paint (in most states).



Push for Industry Stewardship

- 2003 Product Stewardship Institute (PSI) initiates national stakeholder dialogue to develop a better solution for managing postconsumer paint
- Participants include:
 - ACA and paint manufacturers and retailers
 - Federal EPA and state and local governments;
 - Waste Haulers and Paint Recyclers
 - Environmental groups
- 2007 The stakeholder process led to the drafting of a model (state-level) paint stewardship law that is supported by the paint industry
- 2009 OR passes first paint stewardship law as a pilot

Model Paint Stewardship Legislation

- Needed legislation for level-playing field with sustainable financing and consistency across states (nationally coordinated approach)
- 8 states and the District of Columbia have passed the legislation.

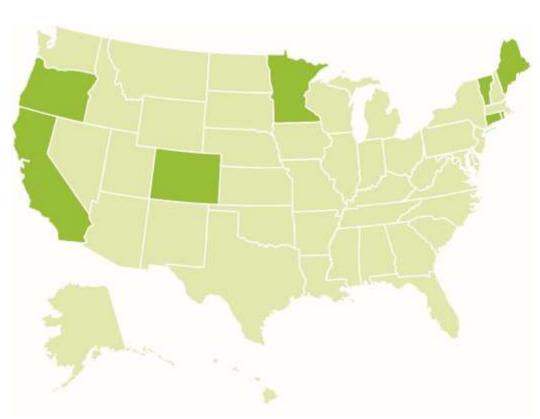

About the Paint Stewardship Law

- Manufacturers selling paint into the state must operate a paint management system
 - Reduce the generation of postconsumer paint; promote reuse, and provide system for recycling and proper disposal of leftover paint
- Requires a plan to be approved by state environmental agency
 - Convenient paint collection locations
 - Environmentally responsible paint management
 - Goals for reuse, recycling and proper disposal
 - Education and outreach plan
 - Budget and assessment rate to fund the program

About the Paint Stewardship Law

- Requires an annual report to the state
 - Total volume of paint collected by type
 - Method of disposition (reuse, recycling, proper disposal) for all paint collected
 - Independent financial audit
 - Education and Outreach Evaluation
 - Reporting and Evaluation of program goals
- Requires annual fee to state agency for plan and annual report review and for oversight and enforcement

PaintCare Funding

 Financing through a per can assessment fee added to the product price of each container sold.

 Manufacturers pay the fees to PaintCare, on a monthly basis based on sales in the state and pass them through to distributors and retailers who add them to the final purchase price of new paint

Collection System

- Retailers paint, hardware, home improvement, reuse
- Household hazardous waste facilities and events
- Solid waste transfer station, recycling centers, landfills
- Paint collection events
- Direct pick-up service





Program Products

Collect the following architectural coatings in <u>5 gallon</u> containers or less:

- Interior and exterior
 architectural paints: latex,
 acrylic, water-based, alkyd,
 oil-based, enamel (all types of
 finishes and sheens,
 including textured coatings)
- Deck coatings, floor paints (including elastomeric)
- Primers, sealers, undercoaters

- Stains
- Shellacs, lacquers, varnishes, urethanes (single component)
- Waterproofing concrete/masonry/wood sealers and repellents (not tar or bitumen-based)
- Metal coatings, rust preventatives
- Field and lawn paints

Non-Program Products

- Industrial maintenance (IM) coatings (must be labeled for IM use)
- Original equipment manufacturer (OEM) coatings (shop use)
- Aerosol paints (spray cans)
- Auto and marine paints
- Traffic, road marking paints
- Arts and crafts paints
- 2-component coatings

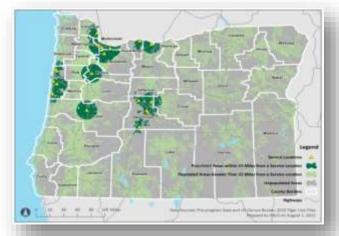

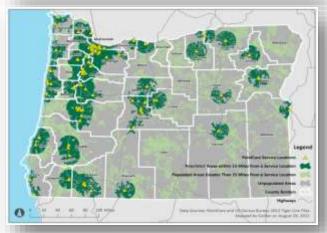
Oregon, California, Connecticut Implementation



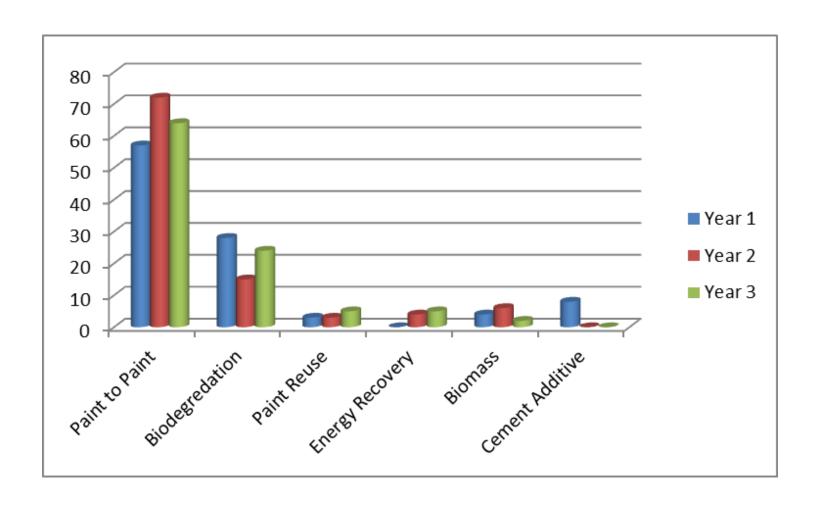
Oregon Highlights

- First PaintCare program, started July 2010
- Became permanent July 2013
- 140+ sites
- 2013 legislation requires 95% of residents to have access to site within 15 miles (achieved), and 1 site for every 30K residents
- Nearly 3 million gallons collected

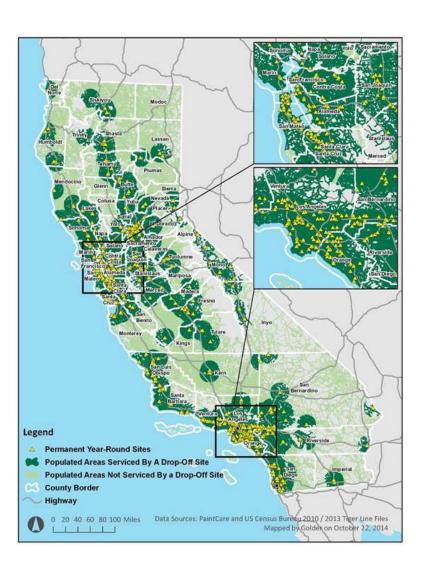




Oregon Latex Paint Disposition



California Program



- Started October 19, 2012
- More than 670 drop-off sites
- Convenience goal provides access to site within 15 miles for 90% of residents (achieved), and 1 additional site per 30K in high population areas
- More than 97% of population lives within 15 miles of a permanent site

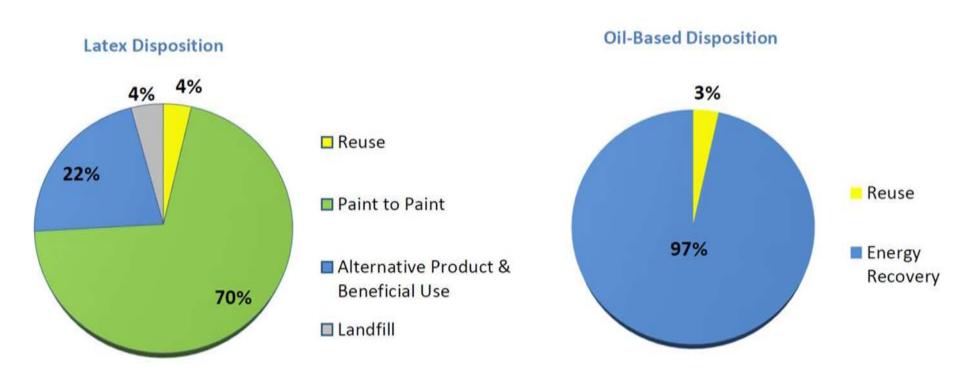

Connecticut Program

- Started July 1, 2013
- Events: 7 during first two months, 2000 participants, approximately 20,000 gallons (365 boxes)
- Processed 240,798 gallons in year 1
- Recovery rate was 4.2% (4.2% of 5,755,458 gallons in sales)

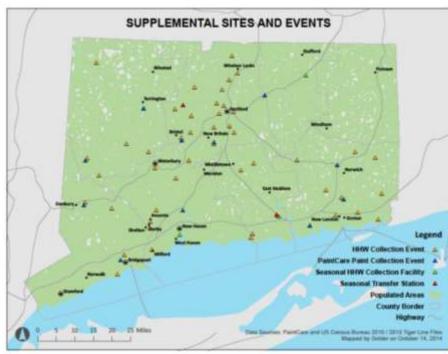

Convenient Collection





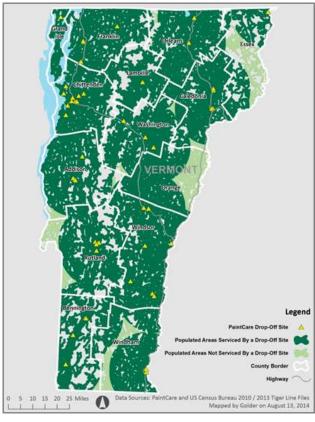
 99.9% of Connecticut residents have access to a permanent year-round site within 15 miles of their home.

Vermont

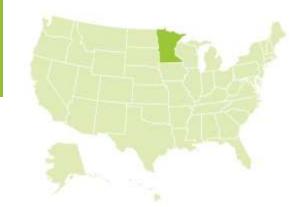
- Launched May 1, 2014
- 60 Permanent Collection Sites
- Convenience Criteria: site within 15 miles of 90% of residents (at 96.5%)
 PLUS 1 site for every 10K residents in a city or town (achieved in 8 out of 9 cities)
- Chittenden County makes recycled paint

- Rhode Island Resource Recovery Corporation
 - Provide all household hazardous waste program services

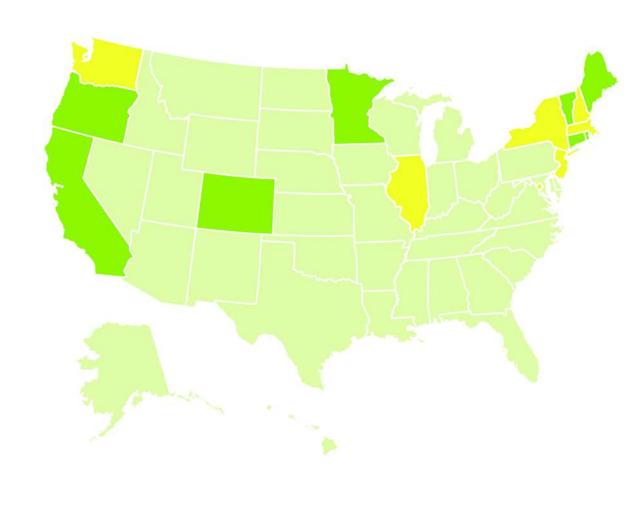

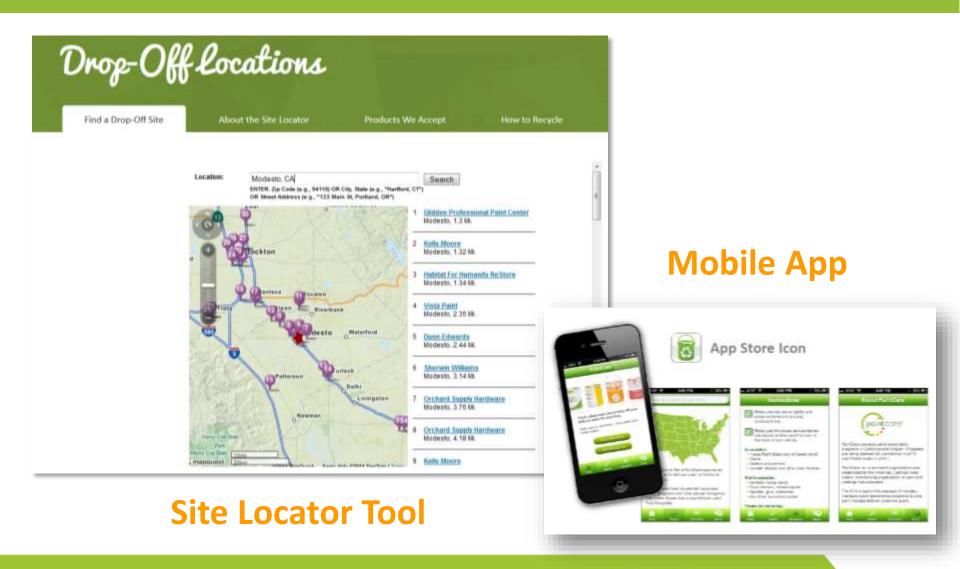

About the PaintCare Program



Funding

The program is funded by a PaintCare Recovery Fee added by manufacturers to the price of all architectural paint sold is California. The law also requires each distributor and retailer to include the fee is the price of architectural paint sold in California. Fees are by container size is follows:

#aif pint or less \$ 0.00
#one than half pint to
#ss than 1 gallon \$ 0.35
gallon \$ 0.75
#one than 1 gallon to 5 gallons \$ 1.60

The retail store can choose whether or not to display the fee separately on sales eceipts. The fee is not a deposit – you do not receive it back when you drop-off paint for recycling.

The funding is used to recycle all of your mused paint, whether it is from lest month or from 20 years ago, and you don't have to buy paint to use the drop-off sites.

Paint Recycling

Paint received at drop-off sites is taken to authorized paint processing facilities where t is properly recycled or disposed.

ntCare* is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization, abilished by the American Coatings Association replement state-mandated paint stewardship grams on behalf of paint manufacturers in its state that adopts a paint stewardship law.

When possible, all projects must include PaintCare's website address and logo and mention that people can find PaintCare drop-off sites in other areas (via our website).
